

PA system









- Need to consider system sufficient for size of arena
- Note will need separate PA system for prize giving if not near commentary box

Software and Radio Controls

- In the UK we regularly use 3 systems
 - SportIdent (AutoDownload)
 - Michael Napier (MERCS) SI or EMIT
 - SportSoftware (OE speaker)





- Radio controls, advice and IT assistance
 - GPProjects
 - upgraded 2015: can support SI, SI-air, EMIT
 - NOT EMIT flyby (Allan Farrington)



 Numbers of PC's/screens depends on radio controls but usually need ~4 screens

Which radio controls?

- ~33% and 66% of the way round classic distance Elite courses
 - Middle, sprint and relays only need one
 - These controls exclusive to elite classes, but common to all elite classes
- Pre-Spectator
 - 1-2 mins before reach spectator control
- Pre-Finish (usually penultimate)
 - Priority course(s)
 - 1-2 mins before athletes in view
- Final control (one common to all classes)
 - Everybody
- Finish (one common to all classes)
 - Everybody
- Road crossings (if timed)



Planning considerations



- Technological constraints
 - Distant controls need mobile phone coverage
 - Signals may not reach over hills or around buildings
 - Radio controls can only be visited once in the race
 - Allow approx 1-2 min running time from pre-warning controls to when runner can be seen (can be a delay to receiving data)
- Timed Road Crossings
 - Both the before and after controls should be radio controls
 - Most commentary software can subtract the time for these controls



Logistics/Issues

- Getting commentary box into required position (e.g. JK 2012)
- Network connection to results/download (<150m cable run)
- Cables from commentary to final control & finish (and protection)
- Timely IT set-up and dedicated support
- Commentary visibility of run in & spectator controls
 - including line of sight on the day: spectators/club tents
- Volume of data coming through
- Amount of individual info (e.g. entry system bio not really practical)
- Miss-punches/retiree's
- Punching/helpers starts
- Relay late changes SI card, running order

Relay Considerations

Commentators' nightmare




- A lot of things, happening all at the same time (manic!)
 - less is definitely more
 - radio controls need to be on common controls
- Dibber check at map issue
 - catch team changes
- Board/area allocated for team's looking for additional runner(s)
 - reduce requests for PA announcements

Information for commentary

- Start lists (inc pre-event)
- Previous day results
- Local info: area, landowners, sponsors, organisers
- Announcements event notices
- Maps
- ? Interview with planners
- Prize giving 'script'






British Long 2013 Winterfold


Arena elite podium start

Arena elite run through with map exchange




British Middles 2013 Stanton Moor

Pre-start in arena
Spectator leg (13-14) for most courses
Pre-warning for elites at control 17
Spectators on 1 side of assembly so view uninterrupted
Visible last control/finish run-in



British Sprints 2013 - Loughborough







- Arena/spectators/commentary inside 'bowl' i.e. limited view
- Only commentary view of race was for the 50m from last control to finish, both heats and finals

JK Relays 2014 - Pwll Ddu

+ve :great for runner viewing in terrain

- -ve: not so great viewing in arena as most spectators couldn't see finish line (obstructed by large marquee)
- stretched out nature made PA
 system difficult to hear from far end of arena where majority of spectators & club tents were situated (lining runout)





Considerations to enhance spectacle

- Elite platform starts in arena
- Arena run through
- Spectator controls with good visibility of approach/exit
- Visibility of last control/ finish approach
- Sweeping long(ish) run-in

- Big screen
- GPS tracking
- Leader's seat sprint/middle













Summary - what is the ideal arena set-up for us

- Elite arena start
- Spectator control with view of approach/exit
- Priority classes pre-warning control ~1-2 mins away
- Common last control and finish
- Decent length sweeping run-in, to give plenty of talking time
- Spectators & tents not obstructing commentary view
- Commentary box close to download for cabling (not Wifi)
- Dedicated readily available IT support (Marsden's please!)
- Prize giving close to commentary box




Relay programme

- Delayed prize giving's JK & BRC 2015
- Awaiting medallists in predominately super vets classes
- BRC 2015: >3 hours running time to decide podium places in M/W70, W60, W40
- Very few entries in some classes
- 2014/15: W14, W18, M18, W40, W60, MW/70: all ≤6 teams
- BRC 2015: W18 1 team
- 'Overuse' of short and ad-hoc
- M/W 70: new class 2014
- 18 classes BRC

Possible changes to relay programme

- Start order MW/70, W60, W40: beginning of programme
- Men's & Women's premier nearer end of programme
- W60, M/W70 shorter courses
- Discourage use of (or get rid of!) junior ad-hoc and short classes
 - 'trophy hunters' (see prior winners)
 - why trophy/prizes for 'B' classes c/w individual races?
 - non-comp teams encouraged to run in age group classes
- Re-order classes similar to urban races? e.g in BRC: M/W 12-, M16-, W16-, M open, W open, M40+, W40+, M55+, W55+, M/W 65+, adhoc = 11 classes c/w current 18
- Avoid current situation of turn up = medal
